

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE: CHRISTOPHER ANKERSEN

Christopher Ankersen is currently Chief of Security at the United Nations Assistance to the Khmer Rouge Trials in Phnom Penh, Cambodia. Previously he has held the posts of Deputy Chief of Security for the UN offices in Geneva and Vienna, and was Security Coordination Officer for Iraq at UN HQ in New York.

Furthermore, he is currently Adjunct Assistant Professor of Politics and Economics at the Royal Military College of Canada. He has produced a number of publications on international relations and strategic studies, including two edited volumes: *Understanding Global Terror* and *Civil-Military Cooperation in Post-Conflict Operations*. His current research interests include civil military relations, post-conflict reconstruction, and risk analysis.

From 2002-2004, Dr. Ankersen was Ralf Dahrendorf Scholar at the London School of Economics and Political Science and, in 2004, he was the recipient of the Canadian Security and Defence Forum Dr. Ronald Baker Doctoral Scholarship. He has received awards from the Royal United Services Institute, the Maritime Awards Society of Canada, the US Department of Defense and the British Army for his writing.

Since 2002, Dr. Ankersen has taught at the LSE, the London Centre for International Relations, King's College London, Carleton University, and the Royal Military College of Canada. He has acted as a consultant to militaries, governments and private firms in the UK and Canada. From 1988 to 2000, Christopher was an officer in the Canadian Forces, serving with Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, including on overseas missions with the UN (UNPROFOR) and NATO (KFOR).

Dr. Ankersen received a BA (Hons) in International Politics and History from Royal Roads Military College (Canada) and an MSc and PhD in International Relations from the London School of Economics and Political Science. He currently lives in Southeast Asia with his wife and four children.
